THE CONFLICT

The new dad loves an Art Deco-flavored crib, but Mom isn't giving up the artful floor lamp she owned pre-baby. Three designers suggest items to bridge the aesthetic gap in a nursery

SOLUTION 1

Find a wall covering in which boy meets girl. Holly Waterfield, lead designer for the Brooklyn Home Company, recommends this dramatic wallpaper. Its inky background connects with the dark, masculine crib while the floral pattern finds a friend in the elaborately feminine lamp. Result: unifying fairytale enchantment, suitable for babies of both

sexes. "A lot of gender-neutral stuff feels boring," Ms. Waterfield said. "This is definitely not boring." House of Hackney's Artemis Wallpaper, \$298 per roll, anthropologie.com



SOLUTION 2

Add a simple but soft rocker. "It's unfussy, without excessive detailing like brass tacks," said Heide Hendricks of this lulling chair. It diplomatically resolves the décor dispute by combining the crib's clean lines with the lamp's sensual curves, encouraging nursery harmony. The Sharon, Conn., designer also noted that the "little uptown detail with the brass runners" echoes the

crib's toecaps, while the visible weave of its upholstery mimics the homespun character of the lamp's woven-paper shade. Compass Rocker, \$899, nursery-works.net



SOLUTION 3

Introduce a handmade toy in a unifying palette. Richmond, Va. interior designer Janie Molster's instinct is to inject a note of childlike whimsy with a pachydermatous mobile. The invitingly tactile elephants of felted, organic lamb's wool blend the rich, earthy hues of the "handsome and serious" crib with the lamp's paler tones and "hand-crafted vibe." Nurser-

ies don't need to be "juvenile or cute, but I do think they need a playful touch," Ms. Molster said. Mobile, \$148, serenaandilly.com
